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Minister's Letter 2020

This has very much been a year like no other.

Following our last Annual Report it began normally enough and that will be reflected in the other reports detailing events and changes so I am not attempting to reflect comprehensively on those things. Simply to say how grateful I am to be part of our church family at Ruislip Manor with its Worship, Learning & Caring, Service and Evangelism.

Part way through the year I had my 4th sabbatical (must be getting old!) which I had decided to use to challenge myself in a new way, stepping outside my comfort zone by teaching at a Methodist school in Chile. With the protests and riots in Chile starting the week I arrived it turned out to be further outside my comfort zone than I could have imagined! However it was still a wonderful experience sharing in the lives of Christians in a different country.

Soon after getting back we were able to welcome a number of people into the family of our church including those who were transferring from South Ruislip. With them we are thankful for the ministry and life of that church dating back to 1944, and for its repurposing as our Circuit Hub. We are sad with them that the church family has had to disband. But we are so glad they have chosen to make their new home with us.

Coronavirus began to impact our lives and we have been learning what it is to be a church when we cannot physically meet. Our weekly newsletter has become even more significant; we are having weekly stewards' meeting on 'Zoom'; a new Facebook Group has been set up; we have been learning how to access services and devotional materials online. Though even more significant has been the way in which our pastoral links, and indeed we all, have sought to keep in touch with and care for one another. Our young people sending Easter cards to those who might feel most isolated is one beautiful example of this.

The English word 'church' derives from the Greek term *kyriakos* meaning 'belonging to the Lord' and this was originally applied to a church building as in 'the Lord's house'. But when the New Testament talks about the people of God, it uses a quite different word, *ekklesia*. This means an assembly of people and cannot mean a building. We get into a muddle when we use the same word, 'church,' to refer to our buildings *and* to God's people. It is God's people – scattered as well as gathered – who are the 'sacred space', rather than any building.

So if you are finding this time without a building difficult and even have a sense of being cut off from the church family, do let me or another member know. If you have any ideas what more we can make of this strange opportunity then again please let me know. Together we are the *ekklesia*, bound by the love of God.

Northwood Live at Home Scheme and our new Ruislip Manor Friendship Group



The Group has continued to meet every Tuesday afternoon, until prevented by the need to suspend its activities because of the Covid-19 pandemic. We miss our friends very much, and are looking forward to the meetings starting as soon as possible after things can return to something approaching normality. The numbers who attend the Group have varied, inevitably, due to illness, hospital appointments and the like, but have remained steady overall, and it's clear that there is much enjoyment to be had, both for the members and the helpers, in the chat, quizzes, exercise classes and other activities. Undoubtedly, however, the most popular part is the lunch, which is provided every week by Shashi, who leads the sessions. It's always beautifully presented and includes fruit – sometimes with mouthwatering mangoes and other delicacies - as well as cheeses, savoury biscuits, pancakes on Shrove Tuesdayand doughnuts! This began, because the necessity for an early start for the sessions, meant that some members were missing lunch, and by the time that they had returned home it was then too late. So, a difficulty has been transformed into another pleasure.

Some of the members are participating in the outings, events and wider activities held at (or from in the case of outings) the main premises at St. John's United Reformed Church in

Northwood. One of these events was the Scrabble competition held there earlier in the year, won by Lindsey from our own group, which was especially exciting! Sadly, the NL@HS holiday has had to be cancelled, but we hope that there will be further opportunities for all those who had intended to go, and especially our members, of course.

We still have five Church volunteers as well as Sue and Rosemary who worked with Active Ageing, and, to everyone's delight as reported last year, transferred their volunteering to the new Group. However, we do need more volunteers from the Church community, to chat, make tea and provide additional help for activities. This doesn't have to be a huge commitment; just one session a month would be so much appreciated or, perhaps, if you have craft skills and would be prepared to teach fairly easy ones on an occasional basis, that would be lovely too. Drivers are still needed, too, to enable those members who cannot use public transport to get to and from St. John's URC from time to time. Do have a word with Val or me (on a no obligation basis) if you feel that you might be able to assist. It's fun and satisfying too!

The Church continues to provide the use of the premises without charge, as part of our support of external charities. The inevitable financial shortfalls, which NL@HS accepts as part of its charitable, work have been offset in part, not just by their own fund raising, but the annual grant from the Bequest Fund to which we have committed for three years. It's good that, as a church, we can make a difference to the resources of a charity which, already makes such a difference to the lives of older people.

Hillingdon Carers Volunteers provide Therapeutic Care to carers in the London Borough of Hillingdon. Hillingdon Carers have been using the Ruislip Manor Methodist Church twice a month for the past 14 years to provide support to unpaid carers in the London Borough of Hillingdon. This service along with all of Hillingdon Carers services are free to carers. We have always found the venue friendly, warm, accommodating and a familiar landmark in Ruislip.

Volunteer Therapists provide Comfort touch to Carers, using therapeutic techniques to provide comfort and support to Carers in a relaxing, comfortable and soothing environment surrounded by gentle music and beautiful aromas to relax the mind, body and soul. The Therapist offers emotional support to Carers whilst they have a 30 minute treatment. Some Carers relish the opportunity to confide to the therapist, others prefer to sit back, relax and have a quiet break. Support workers from Hillingdon Carers attend all sessions,

facilitating peer support and friendship around a large table set up in the lounge area. They also offer emotional support, information, advice and signpost Carers to other levels of community and statutory support that is available. Tea, coffee and light refreshments are also provided to Carers from a Hillingdon Carers Volunteer who is also a Carer. Harlington Hospice also provide two six week **Well Being Workshops** per year using the Ruislip Manor Methodist Church (as well as other locations around the borough) to offer a variety of simple to learn practices that Carers can use every day to enhance coping skills and improve the ability to relax.

Hillingdon Carers are also supported by Ruislip Lions who fund our popular **Ruislip Carers Cafe** - again facilitated at the Church. The cafe offers Carers freiendship, support and lively conversation on the Third Monday of each month. Volunteers from Ruislip Lions supply all the provision and support for this friendly cafe for Carers and the person they care for.

This involved learning common signing phases, exercises looking at leadership styles, storytelling and thinking about how we include everybody in all we do. A chocolate themed evening to celebrate Easter was a reward for the girls thoughtful work on the themes they chose. In summer we worked on Have adventures -Skill builder Camp level 4both as part of preparing for camp and at Camp . We enjoyed activities with a Jungle theme at camp. The weather wasn't as kind to us as the previous year but the girls particularly enjoyed the I'm a leader get me out of here activity were if they got their question right all sorts of gungey beastie things landed on their leaders!. They cooked over an open fire and took part in all camp duties. A Come Rain or Shine Challenge badge and Camp level 4 Badges were awarded to all. We ended the term with a lively summer BBQ for all with a family quiz and various activities ending with an enrolment ceremony. During the autumn term we continued the new guide programme with the girls working on the Innovate level 4 skill builder which included a cookie making competition and designing surgical tools to extract objects from their "body"!. We became Guiding Planet Protectors recycling plastic into patrol emblems and making pledges to use less plastic. We had a wonderful evening celebrating Elizabeth's 21st with Disney themed fancy dress, games and food. The traditional end to the term meant it was Panto trip time. We benefited from the continued support of parents helpers through a personally challenging year for which we are very grateful.

At the beginning of 2019 we reflected on our programmes from previous years and concluded that it might be more helpful to use a study guide that could be completed within one year. We chose the Lent study booklet "Behold the lamb" which contained seven sessions (one each covering the readings for the six Sundays in Lent plus one looking at the Easter Day readings) so slightly adjusted the balance between social and discussion meetings to make sure we could finish working through the booklet by the end of 2019. It prompted some helpful and thought-provoking discussions.

Changes to the car-parking arrangements at Ruislip Lido resulted in us dropping the summer evening walks from our programme, but quizzes, games and meals together continued to be enjoyed.

At the beginning of 2020 we again chose a study guide we expected to complete within the year: "The Kingdom: studies from Matthew's gospel" in the Cover to Cover series. Little did we know that, before we reached session two, the government would have instructed churches to close and banned meetings of more than two people not from the same household. Although we are unable to meet together at the time of writing this report, we are strengthened and encouraged by our friendships and look forward to resuming our programme once the lockdown is lifted.



Christian Aid

Thank you to everyone who donated so generously to Christian Aid during the last year.

Last May we raised £1,403 for Christian Aid week, this was more money than we have raised for several years. This was a very good result as it was the first year we haven't done a house to house collection in the local roads. We are most grateful to Valerie Graham and her helpers who arranged a splendid quiz night. It was a huge success and a most enjoyable evening which raised a lot of money for Christian Aid. The money donated in Christian Aid week last year was used to prevent so many mothers in poor countries dying in childbirth. This year Christian Aid week will go to help people suffering from the results of climate change.

Ruislip Manor Methodist Church is continuing as a Partner Church with All We Can (the trading name for the Methodist Relief and Development Fund). They provide us with publicity materials describing their work and we had an inspiring service, last May, led by Matt Forsyth from AwC who gave us examples some of their work.

We have received a certificate showing the final total raised for AwC in the past Church Year as £923.65p, an impressive total for a small Church.

Having previously featured communities in Zimbabwe, AwC's Autumn Partner Church update gives details of the village and family in, Ethiopia that they are featuring in this years' publicity. Urge lives in the village of Cherkos, Ethiopia with three generations of his family. For Urge, the impact of the climate crisis is first hand. His community and family are feeling the effects on a daily basis. Where they used to have two rainy seasons, they now only have one. This has meant they have a food gap to fill. Without enough food, some of his children have had to move away to earn money to send back to the family. For someone like Urge in Cherkos, Ethiopia, the climate crisis is not just statistics, it is his day-to-day reality. For him, he cannot dismiss climate change as something that isn't happening or that will only affect some future generation. It affects his life, today. It affects his family's future and well-being. All We Can and our local partner have been working to make a difference to the lives of Urge and his community. The small action of growing a specially developed variety of potato has meant that there is now a means of having food where they were experiencing a food gap. The potato farmers of Cherkos can grow enough to feed their families and hopefully sell any excess. That will have a big impact on the whole community.






